Overlapping public and private governance: can forest certification fill the gaps in the global forest regime?

Global Environmental Politics, Vol 4, No 2, 2004, pp. 75-99.

This article investigates whether forest certification (eco-labeling) is likely to rectify certain omissions in the current global forest regime. The study shows that while forest certification would probably promote more sustainable forestry in the temperate and boreal zones than it would in the tropical zone, the ability of this tool to actually do so remains to be seen.

Biodiversity: International Bungee Jump - Domestic Bungle

Skjærseth, Jon B. (ed.), *International Regimes and Norway's Environmental Policy: Crossfire and Coherence*. Hampshire : Ashgate, 2004, pp. 161-195.

This chapter looks into how Norwegian authorities handle biodiversity-related policies in the potential crossfire between international environmental agreements and sub-national actor interests. The analysis suggests that insufficient legal and economic instruments applied for biodiversity protection constitute the major explanatory factors.

The different administrative organisational structures and cultures within national sectors influence follow-up of EU policy, and the success or failure of implementation is dependent on the sector in which the directives are categorised and implemented.

This article evaluates and explains the effectiveness of EU ozone policy.

This chapter sets out to explain why Norway has done well both internationally and domestically with its ozone policies. It argues that a lack of 'crossfire', or rather a sort of 'positive crossfire' where other linked regimes, the core regime (the Montreal Protocol) and national interests have influenced Norwegian ozone policy positively, lies at the heart of the explanation.

The book gives an account of Norway's environmental policy in an international perspective by analysing Norway's behaviour in some of the most important international environmental regimes: climate change, biodiversity, ozone depletion, air pollution, marine pollution and whaling.

The Rapid EU Process: Causes and Consequences

Environment, Vol 46, No 9, 2004, pp. 43-44.

Given the EU's earlier resistance to the market-based and US-flavored emissions trading instrument with no international track record, the less than two-year EU decision-making process can be characterized as a puzzlingly ultra-quick political 'pregnancy'. In order to understand this, it is necessary to take the three explanatory perspectives of problem characteristics, institutional entrepreneurship, and global developments into account.

Skjærseth, Jon B. (ed.), *International Regimes and Norway's Environmental Policy: Crossfire and Coherence*. Aldershot : Ashgate, 2004, pp. 85-111.

Its position as a major net-importer of transboundary air pollution with vulnerable soil characteristics has spurred Norway to seek strong international commitments. This effort has over time been successful, but except for the case of sulphur dioxide, domestic emission reduction performance has been more of a failure. The common underlying factor impeding the development of effective policies is the growth of Norway as an oil and gas producer and exporter in the 1990s.

Offshore Air Pollution and Technological Fixes: How a Greater Need for Norwegian Rather than UK Action Finally Won Through

FNI report 16/2004. Lysaker : FNI, 2004. 31 p.

In terms of offshore technological change, Norway has installed more low-NOx burners and, in recent years, many more VOC recovery systems than the UK. In order to understand this difference, it is important to keep in mind that fundamental problem characteristics differ considerably between the countries. Offshore emissions play a much more important role in the total emission picture in Norway than in the UK, and hence the need to deal with these emissions effectively is greater in Norway.

This study focuses upon the EU packaging waste policy and particularly the role of the packaging industry. This is due to a combination of several factors: significant strength and cohesiveness of industry; excellent industrial access to policy-makers; and moderate strength of counterbalancing forces.

Global Environmental Politics, Vol 3, No 4, 2003, pp. 61-87 (published 2004).

The article discusses the influence of two types of non state actors, green NGOs and scientists. The main analytical contribution is to analyse influence through a multi level approach. To understand the development of the IWC, it is crucial to include nonstate influence at the domestic level in key countries.
